## UITS--Chief Process eXperience Architect (CPXA) Announcement

I am pleased to announce that effective immediately, Tara Bazler has been appointed Chief Process eXperience Architect (CPXA), reporting directly to me.

Some months ago, Brad Wheeler, the VPIT and CIO asked that we find a way to engineer a fundamental transformation in the user experience with IU information systems. From that charge came the decision to recruit and appoint a Chief Process eXperience Architect that will lead an anthropological approach to understanding human computer interactions and integrating those elements into a positive user experience. After a nationwide recruiting process, Tara emerged as the best candidate for the position, mainly because of her extensive educational and experiential background in Human Computer Interactions and related process re-engineering.

While initially the CPXA will be focusing on student systems to ensure that development adequately addresses student's needs, the goal is to ensure that all key information systems at IU are both useful and easy to use.

Tara will be working collaboratively with many stakeholders but her initial assignment will be to assist in the important emerging effort at Indiana University to create a 'Roadmap for Student Success'.

As a part of this appointment, the User eXperience Group (UXG) that Tara helped form and has led for several years will move with her to this new responsibility. She will also be recruiting some additional staff members to assist in rapid prototyping and user interface modeling.

Brian McGough, Director of the Enterprise Services Integration and Delivery division of Enterprise Software will be working on a realignment of his division to reflect these changes and some other emerging responsibilities Brian has assumed in the mobile service space at IU.

Please join me in welcoming Tara to this new role.

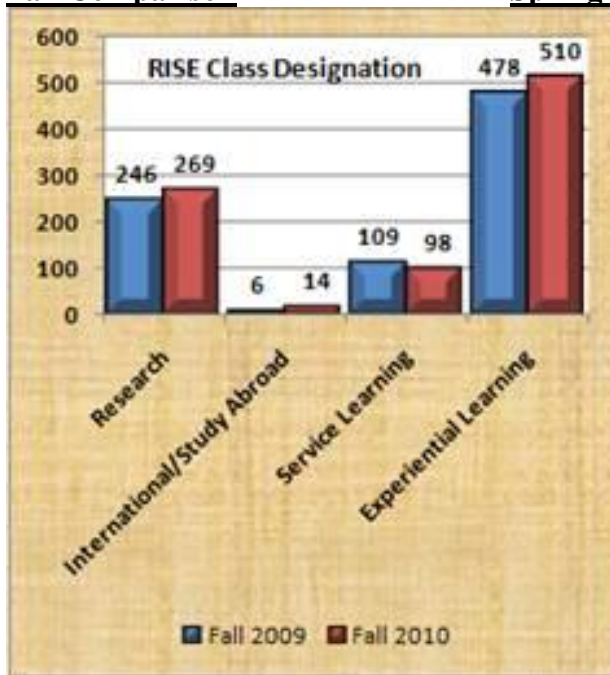

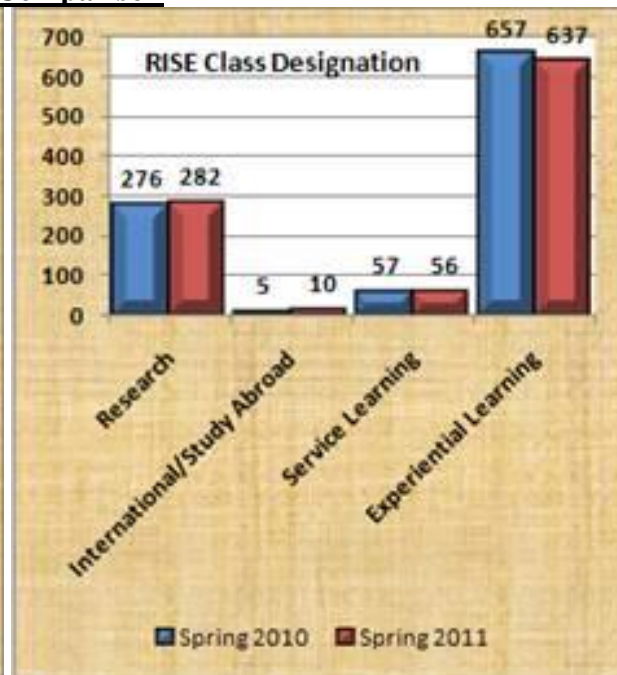

#### Spring Comparison



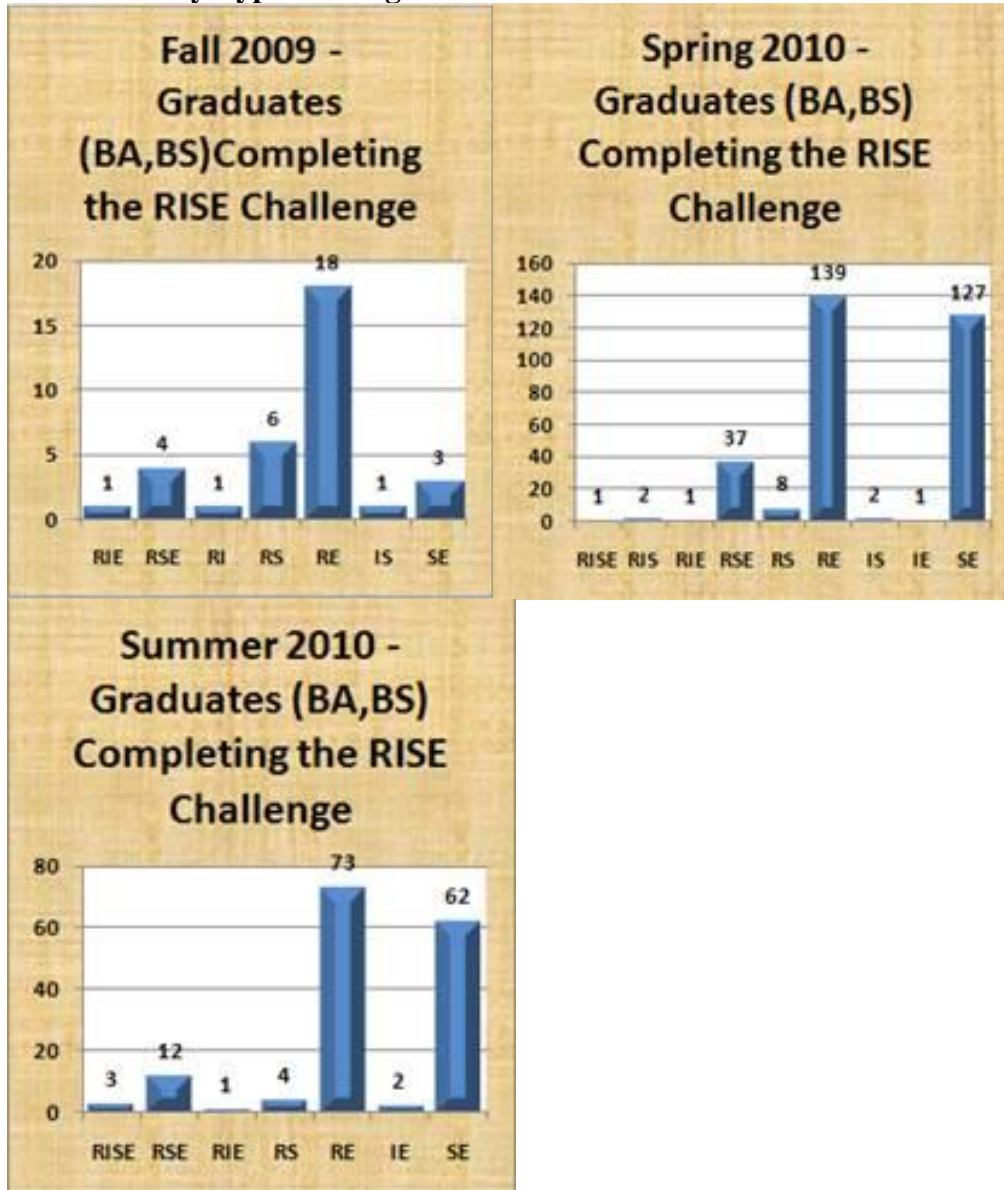

## Federal Student Loan Cohort Default Rates

### **What is a cohort default rate?**

For schools having 30 or more borrowers entering repayment in a fiscal year, the school's cohort default rate is the percentage of a school's borrowers who enter repayment on certain FFELP and/or Direct Student loans during that fiscal year and default within the cohort default period.

Cohort default rates are based on federal fiscal years, which begin on October 1 and end on September 30. Each federal fiscal year refers to the calendar year in which it ends.

The phrase "cohort fiscal year" refers to the fiscal year for which the cohort default rate is calculated. For example, when calculating the 2004 cohort default rate, the cohort fiscal year is FY 2004 (October 1, 2003 to September 30, 2004).

### **Which types of loans are included in the cohort default rate calculation?**

- Subsidized and unsubsidized Federal Stafford Loans and Federal supplemental Loans for Students.

The following loans are **NOT** included in the cohort default rate calculation:

- Federal PLUS Loans (undergraduate Parent Loans)
- Federal Graduate/Professional PLUS loans
- Federal Insured Student Loans (FISLs); and
- Federal Perkins Loans

### **How does the Department of Education calculate a school's cohort default rate?**

The two year cohort default rate is calculated by taking the number of borrowers who entered repayment in a certain year AND defaulted in that year or the year after.....divided by the total number of borrowers who entered repayment in a certain year. Here is a specific example:

Borrowers who entered repayment in 2008 and defaulted in 2008 or 2009  
Borrowers who entered repayment in 2008

10/01/2007 to 9/30/2009  
10/1/2007 to 9/30/2008

### **How does the rate affect IUPUI?**

The US Department has set a threshold percentage rate that if a school reaches that rate they can lose the ability to make future student loans and possibly all federal title IV funding. This threshold is 25%



**What is IUPUI/IUPUC’s most recent Cohort Default Rate?**

FY 2008 is our most recent cohort default rate year and IUPUI has a **3.2%** cohort default rate. For the FY 2008 the National cohort default rate average is **7.0%**. The FY 2007 rate for IUPUI was 3.5%.

**What is the new 3 year cohort default rate?**

The College Opportunity and Affordability Act (COAA) expanded the calculation period for the cohort default rate from 2 years to 3 years beginning in 2012.

**How will the 3 year cohort default rate be calculated?**

Using the previous example, here is how the 3 year cohort default rate will be calculated:

$$\frac{\text{Borrowers who entered repayment in 2008 and defaulted in 2008, 2009 or 2010}}{\text{Borrowers who entered repayment in 2008}}$$

$$\frac{10/01/2007 \text{ to } 9/30/2010}{10/1/2007 \text{ to } 9/30/2008}$$

When we move to the 3 year cohort default rate in 2012, we will still receive a 2 year cohort default rate until 2014 when the 2 year will be eliminated and only a 3 year cohort rate will exist. In addition the threshold will increase from 25% to 30%.

The US Department of Education has “estimated” what the 3 year cohort default rate would be for FY2007 and for IUPUI that rate would go to 5.5%. IUPUI’s FY2007 2 year cohort default rate was 3.5%

**So, what does this all mean?**

This is simply information to explain what the cohort default rate is, how it is calculated and where IUPUI/IUPUC currently stands with regards to default. It is expected that our default rate will obviously increase with the additional year of borrowers who enter repayment and default; however, looking at the estimate, we are in no danger of losing any financial aid funds.

**What are the next steps?**

The IUPUI Office of Student Financial Services will monitor the default rate. We will continue to monitor how well the Department of Education and its servicers do with regards to default prevention since every school is now in the Federal Direct Program. We had very good default prevention with Sallie Mae when we were in the FFELP program and so we are just not certain how well things will be handled. We are looking at ways we can inform students about the consequences of defaulting and how they will be harmed by defaulting on a federal student loan.
