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Student Wins NASPE Award

Preparing Students for Serving All: Adapted Physical Education Clinics

Katie Stanton, Assistant Professor of Physical Education, grew up knowing a world more diverse than most. Her sister, Susie, lives an active lifestyle as a woman with a disability. While Dr. Stanton won't fully attribute her sister's disability to her passion for adapted physical education, it is clear that it had a long-term impact on her professional choices.

Dr. Stanton, a recognized leader in the area of adapted physical education, teaches several courses in the area. "A professor can't simply talk about adapted physical education and expect the students to understand. You must establish an experience with a client for the field to make sense," says Dr. Stanton. This concern, coupled with a significant lack of quality programming for people with disabilities, led her to establish the Motor Activity and Ability Fitness Clinics. They are two distinct, but related, programs that are part of each student's coursework. Fourteen hours of service are required of each student.

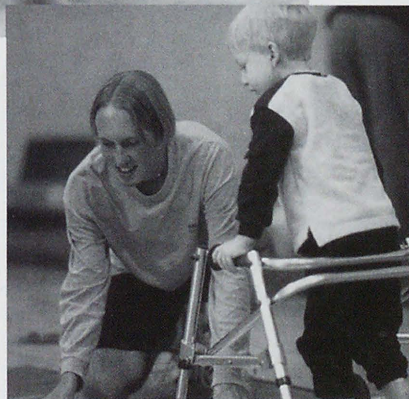
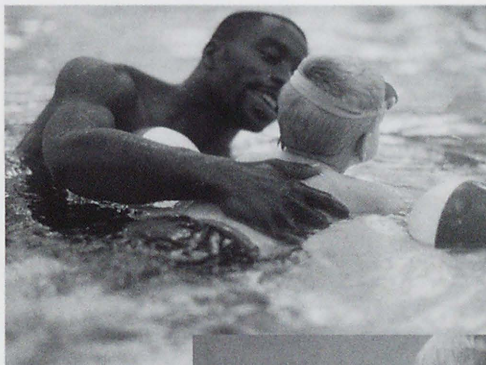
The clinics have an immediate and direct impact on the Central Indiana community. The Ability Fitness Clinic serves adults with disabilities. Students are paired with a client, and the focus is on improving functional strength and flexibility, thereby increasing the quality of one's daily life. With an adult client, students work with people who have lives that may be different from their own and gain an understanding of daily challenges these people may have.

On Saturday mornings, the sound of laughter resonates from children in the Motor Activity Clinic. Some parents are so accustomed to hearing what their children can't do that they are happy to see their children physically active. In addition to offering adapted physical education programming that isn't widely available in Central Indiana, family education is a component. Dr. Stanton meets with families to educate

them on related research, legal issues, and upcoming legislation that could affect them. "You would be surprised at how many people don't know their rights," she adds. Dr. Stanton continues, "In return,

families are providing the students with lessons of tolerance and acceptance before they go into the workforce." The clinic was designed to prepare the School of Physical Education teaching majors; however, all students from P410 and P398 participate.

Students complete self-evaluations of their work with clients every week as a way to monitor progress. Dr. Stanton notes that one of the greatest rewards of the clinics is "watching the students' comfort levels grow. I worry less about how one more person will treat my own sister." She concludes, "The clinics offer a place where kids can play and learn and adults can get stronger."

Henry Lohse Passes Away

Henry Lohse, BS '39, husband of former dean of the School of Physical Education, Lola L. Lohse, passed away in Port Charlotte, Florida, on November 28 at the age of 84.

Lohse was a native of New York City who came to Indianapolis in 1935 to enroll in the Normal College of the American Gymnastic



Union. He was always an accomplished artist, yet turned down a scholarship to art school to enter the teaching profession. Art always was his avocation.

Lohse received his BS degree from Indiana University in 1939 and began teaching in the Indianapolis

Public Schools. He served in the United States Army during World War II before returning to teaching following the war. His teaching career later took him to Warren Township Schools where he taught, became a principal at an elementary school and finally served the school corporation as an assistant superintendent. He retired in 1977 when he and Lola moved to Port Charlotte.

Lohse became very active in the art community once he moved to Florida. He joined the Charlotte County Art Guild in 1978 and began teaching classes. He later served the guild as its president from 1981-82. As membership grew from a handful of individuals to over 700, the idea of a visual arts center for the county emerged.

Henry and Lola Lohse were instrumental in the development of the Visual Arts Center of Punta Gorda, from soliciting funds, to writing grant proposals, to a personal commitment to the project. The building opened in 1989 and is a center for classes and exhibits for adults and children.

Son, David, BS '64, daughter, Catherine Gould of Indianapolis, a sister, Eleanor Garcia of New York City, seven grandchildren and a great-grandchild survive Henry Lohse.

Two Alumni Elected to IUPUI Athletics Hall of Fame

Two graduates of the School of Physical Education have been inducted into the IUPUI Athletics Hall of Fame. Muffy Murphy Price, BS '93, and Julie Rotramel Meeks, BS '92, were formally introduced as the newest members of the Hall of Fame during a banquet held at the National Headquarters of the National Collegiate Athletic Association on January 25.

Muffy Murphy Price's name fills the IUPUI women's basketball record book more than any other person. She is the holder of numerous single game, season, and career records at IUPUI. She holds the school's single game records for most points scored (44), field goal attempts (38) and 3-point field goals made (10) and attempted (21). During the 1991-92 season, she set single-season records for 3-point field goals made (93) and attempted (236) and free throws made (127). That season saw her named NAIA Third Team All-American, Kodak All-American and NAIA All-District.

Price is IUPUI's career record holder in 3-point field goals made (226), 3-point field goals attempted (563), 3-point field goal percentage (.401), free throw percentage (.882) and assists (597). She ended her basketball career as the school's second leading scorer.

Price excelled not only in basketball, but softball as well. She was named Second Team NAIA All-American in 1991 and 1992

and NAIA All-District in 1990, 1991, and 1992. She ranks third in school history with 363 career assists and holds the school's single-season fielding percentage record of .995.

Julie Rotramel Meeks is IUPUI's career scoring leader for women's basketball with 1,809 points. Her 232 field goals made, 531 field goals attempted, and 643 points are single season standards. Rotramel-Meeks also is the school's career leader with 686 field goals made and 1,625 field goals attempted. She was twice selected NAIA All-District and was named both Kodak and NAIA Honorable Mention All-American in her senior year.

During her senior season, she led IUPUI to their second consecutive NAIA District 21 Championship and a berth in the semi-finals of the NAIA National Tournament. In her junior year, she was part of a team that set school records for most wins (25), fewest losses (5), and highest winning percentage (.833) in a single season. She was among the top ten

scorers in the nation during her junior and senior years.

Both Price and Rotramel Meeks are enjoying teaching and coaching careers. Price teaches health and physical education at St. Gabriel School in Indianapolis and Rotramel Meeks teaches physical education at Sullivan (Indiana) High School, where she is also the head girl's basketball coach.
