In March, Herron Galleries offer a breath of fresh air at the intersection of live performance, exhibition and movie screening

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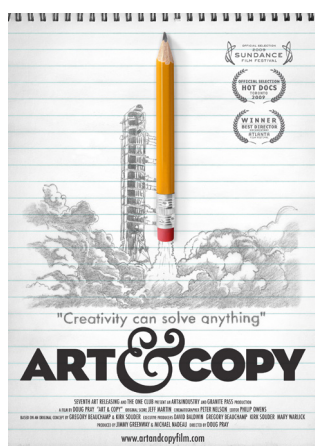
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The end of March will offer a breath of fresh air in a variety of interesting artistic offerings at Herron School of Art and Design. All are free and open to the public.

Art & Copy

in•ter•sect / ,intər'sekt/

Opening in the Basile Gallery on March 28 is *in•ter•sect / ,intər'sekt/*, an exhibition that encompasses live performance, video, sound and sculpture. Visiting artist Daniel Cosentino, who is currently exhibits internationally from his homes in Kosovo and New York, draws upon philosophy to make artworks that accentuate the double meanings introduced by these media. His work includes references to antiquity and historic iconography. He'll be joined by special guests from Herron's Advanced Digital photography class, under the direction of Herron Professor Stefan Petranek. *in•ter•sect / ,intər'sekt/* will include live, pre- and post-opening components that

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explore intimacy and emotional memory expressed through electronic and physical aspects of modern interpersonal relationships. The exhibition runs through April 17.

High School Art Invitational

Opening on March 29 is the first-ever *High School Art Invitational*. Teachers of high school juniors throughout Indiana have been invited to send the two best examples of their students' works—produced in response to the theme “Reflecting on the Arts”—to this juried exhibition. The event includes a reception from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on opening day. Scholarships and other prizes will be awarded to top contenders and teachers during remarks at 3:30 p.m. “During the reception, guests will have the opportunity to tour Eskenazi Hall and see our studio spaces. Representatives of our Admissions and Student Services department will be on hand to provide information regarding Herron and IUPUI admissions, scholarship opportunities, campus life, and our nationally accredited studio art majors and curricula,” said Shannon McCullough, director of admissions and student services. There will also be information available about a variety of Herron community learning programs, including Honors Art, an intensive, two-week course of study for high school juniors and seniors with a serious interest in art and design. The exhibition runs through April 17.

Juvenile In Justice

Continuing in Herron's Berkshire, Reese and Paul Galleries is *Juvenile In Justice*, photographer Richard Ross's tour de force examination of the incarceration of minors. The exhibition closes on April 17, with a next stop at Harvard.

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
